The Wells Scholarship, based solely on merit, provides full tuition and fees, as well as a stipend for four academic years of study at IU Bloomington. The Wells program emphasizes close interaction with faculty; academic and career mentoring; special opportunities for internships, research, and community service; a year-long freshman seminar; and frequent contact with distinguished visitors. Between 20 and 25 incoming freshmen receive the award each year. Students must be nominated to be considered for the Wells Scholarship.

Student candidate should show exceptional qualities of character and leadership; be significantly involved in extracurricular activities; demonstrate concern for their communities; and excel in terms of class rank, grade point average, and performance on national tests. The Wells program is dedicated to ethnic and cultural diversity among its participants.
